Lead Pastor

As I prepare to write this report of pastoral ministry at the conclusion of another year, the following words from a prayer in the Lutheran Book of Worship came to mind. *"Merciful Father, we offer with joy and thanksgiving what you have first given us—our selves, our time, and our possessions, signs of your gracious love."* Thinking over the year now behind us and in anticipation of the hope of life before us, I am moved with joy and thanksgiving for what God has so richly provided as signs of love. I have seen love expressed through those who gather for worship, who sing and play in the choirs, who quietly bring food items and donate money, time and other resources for school kits, quilts, food pantry baskets, and to provide a Thanksgiving dinner. I am thankful for teachers, mentors, altar and funeral guild members. I am filled with joy knowing that expressions of generosity have witnessed support and gratitude for the ministry efforts through Saint Andrew. Fair Trade, Noisy Offerings, local and Church-wide offerings, hurricane response and World Hunger donations are yet more ways you have contributed to the life of Saint Andrew with your support. Several people have participated in Wednesday morning bible studies, and Sunday evening catechism reviews. A faithful group continues to meet on Sunday mornings as well to equip members to grow in biblical knowledge and spiritual insight. A growing number of people also volunteer at the Wausau Warming Center as extensions of the life we are given to share with others. For the seeds planted and numerous conversations around God's word, I am thankful.

I am grateful for a competent staff who works as a team to prepare and integrate members into the life of ministry through Saint Andrew. Much of what is done may appear as routine and sometimes boring, but it only takes one phone call, email or visit and routine goes out the window as staff members spring into action and work together to respond to the most recent need. I am equally thankful to Pastor Jenn and Pastor Jeff for their collegial relationship. Their dedication and heartfelt service to Christ's church is valued by many.

I am additionally grateful for the privilege of participating in the synod's candidacy committee where I am blessed to engage in conversation with those who are preparing for a life of leadership through the church. This is a rewarding and humbling opportunity that allows me to extend the presence of Saint Andrew with the larger church. The need for leadership in the church is growing as the number of rostered leaders preparing to retire is outnumbering those who are discerning a call and preparing for leadership through one of several theological programs among the seminaries. This shortage is raising awareness to the need to ask the question to a variety of people as to whether God might be calling and stirring among us to do as Saint Paul says to the Ephesians, to "equip the saints for the work of ministry." Who knows, maybe God has such a plan for you but no one has dared ask to consider the possibilities. This is a growing edge for Saint Andrew as well as the entire church.

As we turn the page on another year, it is exciting to anticipate what is before us. Regardless where we might find ourselves at the end of 2018, it is with joy and thanksgiving that I look with eagerness for what God is preparing for our future through Christ's church. Thank you for your partnership and for your support as together we strive to bear witness to God's greatest expression of love for the world in Jesus and to define and fulfill the mission we share together through Saint Andrew Lutheran Church.

It always feels slightly like a miracle to me – that on a Sunday morning or a Thursday afternoon or evening, you come to be here at church and receive a message of grace, comfort, and challenge through the Holy Scriptures and the Holy Meal that we share. In his explanation on the Third Article of the Apostles' Creed, Martin Luther teaches and reminds that we can thank the work of the Holy Spirit for bringing us all together again and again.

I believe that by my own understanding or strength I cannot believe in Jesus Christ my Lord or come to him, but instead the Holy Spirit has called me through the gospel, enlightened me with his gifts, made me holy, and kept me in the true faith, just as he calls, gathers, enlightens, and makes holy the whole Christian church on earth and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one common, true faith.

Martin Luther, The Small Catechism

Called. Gathered. Enlightened. This is most certainly the story of our life together this past year. Called into expanded ministry in the community, members of Saint Andrew have shared commitments of time at Wausau's Warming Center, in the hills of Appalachia, in the church building proper, and in the homes, offices, and school rooms to which we are daily called.

Gathered together for worship, the numbers at the front of this report remind us that the ongoing work of life and death draws us together – as our community experienced by tragedy and joy this past year. Note the number of baptisms, the number of members under the age of 20, the number added to those who affirmed their baptism through confirmation, and the saints who joined the church triumphant.

Enlightened by God's word – whether sung at choir practice, studied during one of our various opportunities for learning, or through heartfelt conversation taking place over cookies and coffee on Sunday morning, I am yet surprised at the visions and hopes we share together for ministry to Christ's church through Saint Andrew.

In this, the 500th anniversary of the reformation movement within the whole church, we as Lutherans have had much to celebrate. The legacy of the reformation now continues through us. I would invite you to consider how you might jump into shaping the next movement of the Holy Spirit through the church. Perhaps that means joining a ministry and serving in a smaller way. Maybe that is making a spiritual discipline to immerse yourself in God's word. It could look like dedication to praying for someone specifically or for our life together as a community.

This year I was profoundly grateful for the gift of a sabbatical. While "thank you" doesn't seem quite enough – summed up in those words is an experience I have had of healing, rest and renewal. Even now as this report is shared, the second portion of my sabbatical is underway. I pray that this time helps to renew our commitment to shared ministry as pastor and people... a special thank you to Pastor Craig and the staff for their care and efforts to cover a larger work load in my absence. The time and funds to explore reformation heritage in Germany, participate in leadership development through the ELCA, and renew my spirit has been a profound gift. For those gifts and for your prayers, thank you. It continues to be one of the deepest joys of my life to be a pastor in this place. May God continue to bless us and keep us.

"Grace and Peace from God, our Father, and our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ."

That is, dear friends, our context as we end and begin, as we hello and goodbye, as we invoke and benedict; yes, as we are born and as we die to be raised, we live in God's grace; in Christ's peace.

The first Sunday again of the new year is The Baptism of our Lord. I confess that the Sacrament of Baptism has become more meaningful and substantial in both my particular ministry, as well as my faith.

As a visitation pastor, and an on-call chaplain, I often return to the baptismal blessings and promises in the context of life, and even more so in the context of death. Through this last Christmas at the hospital, I have been involved in at least six deaths. As I use the Commendation Service, it includes the words from Romans 6; *"Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his."*

God chose and loved us. Luther reflected on Baptism as a sign of God's ownership of us. God has paid a price for us, bought us and marked us. We need not fear Luther reasoned, for God is a "jealous" God, and does not take kind to other gods fooling with us. William Willimon writes in *"Remember Who You Are"...* "Baptism insures that my whole life, from birth to death, start to finish, will be under the promise and sign of the cross. Baptism is a sign and means of God's ceaseless striving for us, the ceaseless urging of grace. God reaches for us first when we are baptized as babies, and God continues to reach for us throughout life." The *Heidelberg Catechism* (1563) asked; "What is your only comfort in life and in death?" Answer: That I belong—body and soul—not to myself, but my faithful Savior, Jesus Christ.

How marvelous it is to reflect of the gift and grace of Baptism—God's daily and ceaseless striving for us (think of how this is in your life) and for this world – as we are called to baptize and be channels of grace as Jesus commissions to go and baptize in his name and power.

Our Baptism certainly is a life-long gift with a life-long of unwrapping; of acceptance, affirmation and spirit-filled activity and fruits. We have a friend who is deeply moved when she witnesses a Baptism; usually in her church, it is an infant (not always). As she would understand it, infant baptism is pure absolute grace, as we do nothing to earn it. Willimon says when Paul writes that God loved us when we were helpless, he could have used the word babies. Our friend seems to realize her baptism with each baptized and is reminded of her own infant baptism; as she rejoices with song and tears, and yes, promises with the faith family to witness God's love for the child and the world in Jesus – as she is a Sunday School teacher and Confirmation leader/mentor.

It was the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation last year; that makes this the 501st in these anxious days and times, through inner turmoil, confusion and dark nights of the soul, we may do as Martin Luther did; sometimes touching his forehead and saying to himself, "Martin, be calm, you are baptized."

Audit Committee

The Audit Committee is in the process of finalizing the audit for the 2016 financials. Recommended enhancements for clarity and recording keeping will be reviewed and discussed.

Endowment Committee

Our Endowment Fund continues to grow. As of year-end, the balance is \$59,135, after we supported five different grants for a total of \$4,500.

Finance

The Finance/Stewardship Ministry meets monthly to review contribution and expense statements that show the current financial position of Saint Andrew. Support and recommendations are provided to ministries and the council from this information as requested or needed.

Financial Peace University

To assist members with their own personal financial process, the Dave Ransey Financial Peace Course also continues to be offered annually at Saint Andrew.

Stewardship & Budget Process

We continue to see a similar pattern over the last few years. Approximately one-third of SALC households pledge and contribute, one-third do not pledge but do contribute and roughly one-third are inactive with no contribution. This poses the question, "*Will the congregation support the proposed budget?*" So far they have - ***Thank you for that!***

This is the third year sharing the Narrative Budget format which has been received well, reflecting the ministry outreach and programs at Saint Andrew. Again for the coming year of 2018, we have proposed a budget that exceeds anticipated income currently pledged and hope the SALC membership will respond generously to meet or exceed our program needs.

Outreach Ministry is offered to help visitors and members of Saint Andrew feel welcome, connected and cared for. As members of a community of faith, Saint Andrew welcomes and acknowledges each other in times of need, support and blessings. This Ministry does not currently meet on a monthly basis but members continue to share their time with the following activities:

Hospital and Homebound Visitation - Area hospitals are contacted during the work week to inquire about member hospitalizations so pastoral care visits can be made to those members. Additionally, regular visits and communion is shared with SALC members that may be unable to leave their homes and attend worship.

Greeter Program - SALC members volunteer through time and talent to greet members and visitors as they arrive to attend Sunday morning worship services.

Care Note Program – There is a materials rack in the Narthex that offers information brochures, as well as reading booklets for all ages to offer comfort and reflection with regard to personal situations.

Phone calling and Card Program - An Outreach Ministry member makes phone calls and sends cards to members that are made by church school children, sharing with them that they are thought of and that the church is praying for them. Another member makes calls to members who have signed up on their time and talent cards to make food for funerals, Lenten soup desserts and other events as needed.

Quilt Group - On the second Tuesday of each month quilts are made to be shared in the community (the VA and local hospitals, Women's Shelter, Salvation Army, Hospice House, local fire departments).

Prayer Shawl Program - Prayer shawls are knitted and crocheted by members for anyone that needs a shawl to provide comfort and prayers.

Ongoing Goals:

- Member Outreach is looking for additional members and welcomes suggestions for outreach ideas to grow this ministry.
- Offer a new opportunity to sew or knit "Chemo" caps to be shared with local individuals who are receiving oncology treatment and support.

Mission of Ministry: Programs and activities have been developed and expanded by Social Ministry to minister to the needs of Saint Andrew and to the needs of our neighbors beyond the doors of Saint Andrew.

Goals met by Social Ministry in 2017: Our goal of partnering with other faith based non-profits continued this year. We again developed a team of volunteers from Saint Andrew to staff the Wausau Warming Center two Fridays a month, from November 1st to April 30th. We continued our involvement in the area school program, Blessings In A Back Pack, shopping for and making two deliveries from our ministry, as well as four church council sponsored deliveries. With your continued support of our activities, we were able again this year to support our many community and church programs with monetary donations of \$3,507 as well as another \$400 for ELCA World Hunger. We continue to provide emergency food baskets to meet the needs of church members and members of our community.

- **Supported:** Saint Andrew VBS, Hardel's Hope, Wausau Women's Community, Area Hygiene Drive, Neighbors Place Empty Bowls, Wausau Warming Center, Adaptive Community, Open Doors, Blessings In A Back Pack and Covenant Community Presbyterian Hearts Of Hope
- **ELCA:** Lenten season drive to end world hunger

Other supported activity

- **Super Bowl Snack Sale:** Many prepared and/or purchased snacks to support our annual sale.
- **Lenten Soup and Sandwich:** Many volunteers, adults and youth alike, help to make these dinners a huge success each year. We are **very thankful to the many** that supported us by partaking in the meals and purchasing the soup, which supports most of our activities throughout the year.
- **Tuesday Morning Quilters and Individual Volunteers:** Our quilters made 83 quilts and 50 school bags for Lutheran World Relief. Quilts were also donated to the Wausau Women's Community and lap activity mats were donated to area Alzheimer patients.
- **Congregation:** The congregation supported a pull tag board to help cover the cost of filling the school bags for LWR and supplies for lap activity mats.
- **Community Dinner:** Three meals are planned, prepared and served on three Sundays during the year. The meals are served at First Presbyterian Church in Wausau. We average about 100 servings per meal.
- **Fair Trade Coffee and Chocolate:** We offer this product at cost. Your support benefits small farmers.
- **Crop Walk:** The Crop Walk took in a record amount of \$2000 with 17 walkers participating.
- **Emergency Food Baskets:** Food baskets are available to all in need.
- **Cradle of Love Baskets:** Located by our entry doors, these baskets encourage weekly food donations.
- **Holiday Food Baskets:** Food baskets are available at Easter and Christmas to all who are in need. Requests are taken at the church office.
- **Thanksgiving Meal:** A traditional Thanksgiving dinner is offered to all, creating an opportunity to both volunteer and partake. Over 170 people were served this year.
- **Wausau Warming Center:** Open 7 days a week for 6 months a year, the WWC offers many opportunities to volunteer nightly from 6:30 pm to 8:00 am. Twenty-eight congregation members have volunteered to cook for and staff the center during the 2017-2018 season.

Goals and Vision for 2018

- Continue to meet the needs of our congregation through better communication on what services can be offered by our ministry, through our mission as stated in Matthew 25:35
- Continue to find ways to improve participation and communication with those who would like to help with the many activities
- Continue to explore ways to work with other faith based non-profits within our community

The Worship Ministry is the umbrella ministry for the entire worship life at the church of Saint Andrew. The members oversee:

- Altar Guild
- Communion Servers and Plate Holders
- Lay Readers
- Music, including
 - Accompanists
 - Bell Choir
 - Chancel Choir
 - Special services and musicians
- Nursery
- Ushers

The year 2017 was a year of local and national tragedies, but also a year of accomplishment as we worked to live the Saint Andrew Mission statement: *[we] wish to express [our] faith in God through Jesus Christ by worship, learning, witness, and service.*

Saint Andrew was blessed with this year with the following gifts of time, talent, and treasure that contributed to our worship journey:

- **Celebration of Reformation - 'Nailed It!'** Worked with Education and Social ministries to recognize the 500th anniversary of Reformation with (root) Beer and Pretzel Sunday and discussion of Luther's Small Catechism during services and additional study. Doors with Luther quotes were positioned in the fellowship hall throughout the year to encourage discussion and thought.
- **Stained Glass in the Sanctuary** – We thank the family and friends of Sara Quirt-Sann for this gift in her memory. Memorial Gift and Property worked with the family and the artists to create a design that will enhance the worship experience for everyone entering the sanctuary.
- **The music staff** – A special call-out to Al Freiberg for coordinating five worship services a week with accompanists Joel Freiberg, Joanne Howard, and Mari and Nate Card. Also, Jan Nelson not only contributes special music with her flute throughout the year, she is also the music librarian, organizing the Saint Andrew music inventory.
- **Refurbished and expanded sound system** – Thanks to the Memorial Gift and Property Ministries, new sound equipment and microphones were purchased. The system is now compliant with current FCC bandwidth use rules, the 'dead zone' in the sanctuary has been improved, and new speakers have been installed in the fellowship hall, kitchen, and chapel to allow the service to be heard in those areas. Sound can be controlled remotely by PC or tablet. All labor for this project was donated. Thank you to Al Brace of Property for drilling the speaker holes in the fellowship hall and running the wiring; Phil Bickley for getting the scissors lift to allow installation of additional speakers in the sanctuary and open area of the fellowship hall; Joel Freiberg to identify and order the correct equipment, then install and calibrate it; and Al Freiberg for documenting requirements and coordinating all the installation work. Did we mention that all this labor was donated?
- **Reserved cloth signs completed** – speaking of donated labor, a multi-year, in-house project to create cloth Reserved signs to replace smaller lead-weighted signs that weren't reliable was completed this year. The cloth signs were used for the first time on Sunday, August 6th for a baptism. This was a combined effort of Worship, Memorial Gift, and Altar Guild members to select and pay for the material and embroidery. All cutting and sewing was done by members of the congregation. A special thank you to Darlene Bahr for finishing the project.

- **First Faith** – Last year Christian Education Ministry, the pastors, and parents came together to work out an option for 2-5 year olds to learn prayers and simple songs in their own setting and hopefully allow parents a Sunday or two to focus fully on worship. A room and materials customized for toddlers was set up, decorated and staffed and has been a success for the children and parents.
- **ALL the Saint Andrew volunteers and staff** – Thank you on behalf of the entire congregation to the Altar Guild, choir members, 9:30 am nursery staffers, nursery toy cleaners, First Faith parents and teachers, musicians, lay readers, ushers, activity bag fillers, the traffic guides on Christmas Eve and Easter Sunday, the shovelers on the mountain for Easter. You met so many worship needs for this congregation that we can't name everyone individually but are grateful for your time and talents shared.

A world experiencing the difference God's grace and love in Christ makes for all people and creation.


We are church for the sake of the world, united by a common purpose.
