Since, then, we have such a hope, we act with great boldness, not like Moses, who put a veil over his face to keep the people of Israel from gazing at the end of the glory that was being set aside. But their minds were hardened. Indeed, to this very day, when they hear the reading of the old covenant, that same veil is still there, since only in Christ is it set aside. Indeed, to this very day whenever Moses is read, a veil lies over their minds; but when one turns to the Lord, the veil is removed. Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the glory of the Lord as though reflected in a mirror, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another; for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit. Therefore, since it is by God's mercy that we are engaged in this ministry, we do not lose heart. We have

renounced the shameful things that one hides; we refuse to practice cunning or to falsify God's word; but by the open statement of the truth we commend ourselves to the conscience of everyone in the sight of God.

The gospel according to Luke

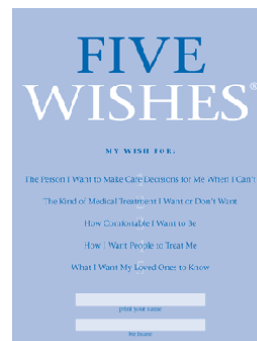
Glory to you, O Lord.

Now about eight days after these sayings Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah"—not knowing what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

WORSHIP WORD

Today's gospel finds us living in our contemporary world as we wait for a world that is to come. In a way, this day is caught outside of time, balanced between the seasons of Epiphany and Lent, with characters from the Old and New Testaments undergirding both the disciples' past and God's future. We stand on this mountain with Peter, John and James.

"Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep" (Luke 9:32). As we overbook our calendars, our jobs demand more time, and our social engagements keep us spread too thin, being weighed down with sleep is a reality most of us know well. Tired as they were, the disciples stayed awake and saw the wonderful events that unfolded. In today's gospel Peter, John and James are merely awake and that is enough. No need to build a dwelling or to run and tell the masses. Instead, they watch. Might this be an invitation to watch what God is doing where we are rather than rushing to what we think is next?

CARING CONVERSATIONS



Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- Talk or think about a time you had an amazing experience.
- When has God seemed to be most present to you?
- We typically separate times of ecstasy and glory from times of suffering. Why does the Bible and Christianity hold these two so closely together?

DEVOTIONS



Read: Luke 9:28-43a.

The presence of Moses and Elijah on the Mountain of Transfiguration unites Jesus with the same God revealed in the Old Testament. Moses represents the law and Elijah the prophets. The two Old Testament figures speak to Jesus about his "departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem" (v. 31). The word for "departure" in Greek is *exodus*, the great act of God's deliverance, God's salvation in the Old Testament. Jesus' exodus, his great act of salvation will now be fulfilled in Jerusalem through his suffering, death, and resurrection. Jesus' dazzling white appearance shows God's glory completed through his departure in Jerusalem. Reflect on how Jesus' dazzling white appearance in glory is completed in what he accomplishes in Jerusalem. How does the suffering we experience today help us to experience God's presence in our lives?

Pray: **God of power and glory, help us to see your glorious presence in our lives. Be with those who are experiencing times of suffering. Amen.**

SERVICE



Jesus descends from the Mountain of Transfiguration and immediately he is seen teaching and healing a father's son (Luke 9:37-43a). Healing diseased bodies and teaching others are both forms of Christian service. How do you offer healing to those who are hurting or teaching to those who could use instruction? Name those in your community who heal and teach as a profession. Consider donating time or money to organizations where they are involved. In what other ways can you support them?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



In Luke, the transfiguration of Jesus happens while he is praying. This dramatic encounter with God on the mountain is seen through the dramatic encounter with God in prayer. Transfiguration Sunday is the last Sunday in the season of Epiphany. It is an old tradition to serve grapes, apples, and other fruit to celebrate the transfiguration of Jesus. This week celebrate the transfiguration by serving a tray of grapes in the shape of a cross surrounded by other fruit. When served, top with whipped cream to represent the cloud appearing on the mountain. Discuss how we experience God's glorious presence through prayer.
