### Associate and Lead Pastor

"Lord let my heart be good soil, open to the seed of your word. Lord let my heart be good soil, where love can grow and peace is understood." - Handt Hanson

The definition of growth spurt is "growing quickly and suddenly in a short period of time." It's amazing to me that a kernel of corn can go from being planted late in April to a 10-foot-tall plant in about 56 days; and be fully harvested in 135 days. What's more amazing is that this happens every year. The stole and paraments that we see the most at Saint Andrew are the green set that feature leaves and berries which represent growth.

This was a year of growth at Saint Andrew in every sense of the word. In the reports that follow mine you will find a harvest of fruit – where through diligent planning and care, people have extended the mission of Saint Andrew deeper and wider than ever before. When your mission is *openness* to everyone, because of Christ's openness to us, the fruit of that openness looks like growth.

Because of Saint Andrew's unique mission, to be open to all through worship, learning, witness, and service, we have seen people's lives change for the better. The hungry have been fed; the homeless have been visited; the stressed out parent has been consoled; the ones in love have been married; homes have been blessed; babies have been baptized; children have been taught; communion has been brought; the burden of grief has been shared; the choirs have sung, and throughout it all, God has been providing growth.

Growth can also feel like change. And change can sometimes be difficult and even sad. In 2019 we had two significant farewells: After 12 years of faithful service in the role of Parish Administrator, we bid farewell to Shelby Gjertson. Her deep faith and care in ensuring a smooth transition was a gift to me personally and professionally. After ten months of faithful service, Pastor Gary Brandenburg ended his interim ministry at Saint Andrew and is now ministering to Grace Lutheran Church in Tomahawk. His wisdom and guidance helped me to grow in my sense and understanding of "call" and I am grateful to call him "friend."

This was also a year of substantial change for me. Seven years (to the day) after you called me to serve as Associate Pastor, my first call came to an end as you entrusted me again to serve in a new capacity as Lead Pastor. Although the pastoral care part is the same, as is the worship leading, preaching and teaching, much of the behind the scenes work is not the same. When asked by colleagues how things are going at Saint Andrew and with my call I will often reply, "It's a new call in a familiar setting."

We also are fortunate to see the good fruit growing as a result of the diligent work of the faith formation ministry: Jenna Diedrich joined the staff in August and has brought with her significant leadership development skills and her focus on working with the confirmation program and learning at every age has brought some much needed consistency to these opportunities.

I have been challenged to grow in asking for help frequently, and so many of you have responded with care, support, and encouragement. Your notes, kind words, visits, and cards have sustained me in this season of fullness. A special thank you to Joy Mitchell, Shannon Vujnovich, Pastor Jeff Martinson, Al Freiberg, Sheldon Geiger, and the rest of the staff is necessary. As is to the church council, ministry leaders and members, and the executive council, Kerry Fehrman and Derek Hoff, who have given so much of their time and energy in this year of transition. This talented and strong team continues to work hard for the mission of Saint Andrew and so many of you and I am fortunate to serve among them.

Soon we welcome Pastor Justin Smoot who will share with us his love for God's story and provide good and steady pastoral care for members of Saint Andrew and this community. I am excited to watch him

flourish and grow well into this new call that we all share together with him as he begins to enter your lives in the role in which it has been a privilege of mine to serve.

Now as we begin the 40<sup>th</sup> year of our life together – I look forward to witnessing the continued growth that is possible when we are planted together in good soil and open to the seed of God's good word among us.

### **Visitation Pastor**

2020! Holy Wow! It seemed like yesterday as I began 2019 with: "When we've been there ten thousand years bright shining as the sun; we've no less days to sing God's praise than when we'd first begun."

We didn't know what 2019 would have in store (please accept this personal report in relationship to my work/calling). In February I went to Florida to celebrate my parents' 70<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary. It was a wonderful time - though at ages 93 and 95 there were concerns. From August to September I made three more trips. Dad needed emergency surgery, and when hopes for his recovery and rehab were exhausted, he was admitted to hospice care, and died September 25<sup>th</sup>.

Thus, we return to the theme of "Amazing Grace" every year - for me, every other day. Dad (Harland) was an independent, determined, stubborn promise keeping Norwegian; he was to care for Mom, as was the vow.

My Dad was not meant to lie in bed in a hospital gown; he wanted his shoes; to go work in the orchard, to check out the car. He had driven three million miles (two million as a truck driver). Last February he drove us the 30 miles to Abiding Savior (their church) for worship. Dad passed the faith on to his children. Last April Dad and Mom were the Easter Greeters – robustly pushing walkers with the news of the Resurrection of our Lord.

Dad had a faith-salvation story which he had submitted to Guidepost. On that wintry day, early morning on ice, he lost control of the semi-trailer carrying dairy products on I-94 between Milwaukee and Madison. The trailer skidded and swerved, crashing down the embankment into the Rock River – where it stopped. The refrigeration unit slammed, clanked and shook the cab, as the large truck clung, by that unit, to the great rock before the river. Amazing Grace - sound familiar? The man in the tow truck assessing the situation, asked Dad if he believed in God (pointing out how his life was spared-saved).

In hospice care, when he wanted his pants on to go to work, I helped to remember the story, and all the trips he made - prayed safely home. As God has, God promised and will. (Dad sincerely sought to imitate Christ, in his way, he was a light. Even then we shared real and current concerns we had about the country; then he would affirm that God is still in control, and to trust.) Let's back up a verse or two:

"Through many dangers, toils and snares, I have already come; tis grace has brought me safe thus far, and grace will lead me home."

So, then my Dad asked if we could take a picture. In that smile was salvation in both real and eternal time. (Say Cheese and Go Packers was a line and crinkle). I realized my roles, Son, Pastor-Chaplain - callings and roles were joined in blessing. And, certainly, I can thank my Father, in part, for this grace that I can be here now in this wonderful place, even in this very challenging time to help keep faith and affirm God's saving grace to a world, yet lost and idolatrous, which God so loved.

Then if there are no less days to sing God's grace, there is no less grace to speak God's Word, and proclaim God's Love, than when we first begun. Thanks be to God; Thy kingdom come!

# **Faith Formation Coordinator**

The Faith Formation Coordinator Position officially started in August of 2019. This position came with a full schedule of programs already in place with room to explore new and different ways to guide Saint Andrew members on their lifelong faith formation journeys.

September kicked off with Rally Sunday and the church picnic and 99 students attended the first day of Sunday school. Confirmation started, welcoming in 17 - 7th grade students.

October was a busy month starting with the 9<sup>th</sup> grade confirmation retreat and then worship confirming 31 students. I also attended the Vibrant Faith Symposium in Chicago. It was a very informative experience and the ideas I picked up there were very influential in creating my plans for a model of lifelong faith formation to present to Saint Andrew in 2020.

In November we taught First Communion sessions to 15 students. This was a new time of year, and the First Communion worship was held during the early part of December during Advent. We also had three people attend the 5G: Generosity Project in Plover to learn skills in Intergenerational Programming.

Faith Formation presented "Too Many Shepherds" as the annual Christmas Program for Sunday school students. The skit was a change of pace from the previous years of singing. It was also optional for kids to participate.

Throughout the fall season we also created a committee to plan the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2020. The team came up with four events to highlight the legacy of SALC and celebrate the gifts we have been blessed with over the last 40 years.

I also worked to enhance Saint Andrew's online presence, highlighting archives and history posts as well as current events happening at church and engaging our online audience.

These areas of the Faith Formation Report have received focused efforts:

- Develop Faith Formation Ministry and associated staff leadership that supports all members on their life-long faith formation journeys
  - o Hired full-time Faith Formation Coordinator
- Enhance Saint Andrew communications to allow for consistent awareness among members and the community we serve
  - Improved SALC's Facebook presence
- Created a 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Team for 2020 celebration
- Develop Small Groups that allow self-management with faith growth, community, social, and relationship building connections
  - Started "Evening with the Holy Sprits" as a casual faith-based discussion group

We host weekly Sunday fellowship, the annual Church Picnic, Pretzel Sunday and Palm Sunday and plan and organize special family outings, community service projects and seasonal events. Following Sunday morning worship service, we offer coffee, juice, milk and cookies for fellowship between services, so are responsible for coordinating volunteers to host the early and late services and to bake cookies.

New this year, we organized new craft events: paint pouring and advent centerpiece workshop. The paint pouring evolved into a weekly art/fellowship event called ArtDevo. It is open to all in the Activity room and run by Pam Clark. Talented artists from Saint Andrew continued work on the final details of the murals in the Sunday School Rooms.

**Stewardship** The goal of the Stewardship Ministry is to help our congregation grow in their relationship with Jesus through the use of the time, talents and treasures God has entrusted to them, in fulfilling the mission of Saint Andrew Lutheran Church.

The Time and Talent booklet was updated for 2020 to include *Interests, Occupations and Resources* to provide more opportunities for people to participate in and contribute to the life of Saint Andrew. A Ministry Fair was held in September so members could learn about the work of our various ministries and how they can participate.

**<u>Finance</u>** The goal of the Finance Ministry is to help ensure that the offerings and gifts that Saint Andrew Lutheran Church has been entrusted with are applied effectively in advancing the mission of Saint Andrew, by assisting with the development of an appropriate annual budget, conducting monthly review of the finances, providing information and support to the council and ministries, and providing oversight of the Audit and the Endowment Fund Committees.

We continue to use the narrative spending plan format which shows how the offerings we receive are used to achieve the missions of Saint Andrew. The allocation to the five main categories (Worship, Congregational Support, Learning, Witness and Service), has changed for 2020 to show increased emphasis on Learning, Service and Congregational Support. While the proposed spending plan for 2020 again exceeds anticipated income, we are confident that the mission work of Saint Andrew will continue to be done with the generous support of our congregation.

#### Audit Committee

Members: Mark Gleisner, Tom Weiland and Terri Fronek. This committee reviews the records for clarity and accuracy and then offers recommendations for improvement. The audit for 2017 and 2018 is still in process. A new Accounting Policies and Procedures Manual has been created as recommended by the previous audit.

#### **Endowment Committee**

Members: Ray Skare-Chairperson, Josh Wiesman, Jack Fischer, Sarah Verber, Dick Jarvis and Karen Gleisner. In 2019, \$5,506 was available for grants. Two grants totaling \$3,700 were approved in 2019: \$1,000 to the Library Guild and \$2,700 to the Senior/Lead Pastor Training Program at United Lutheran Seminary. One grant application was denied. The fund is allowed to pay out up to 10% of the year-end balance in the next year.

#### **Counters**

#### **Mortgage**

The mortgage came due in July and was refinanced with a 20-year amortization at 4.59% for 5 years. The balance is now \$658,813 down from \$787,898 last year. An extra \$10,768 in *Freed for Mission* contributions were received in 2019. At our current payment pace, there are about 58 payments left.

# Outreach ministry is offered to help visitors and members of Saint Andrew feel welcome, connected, and cared for.

In February of 2019, council had intentional conversation about rebooting the Member Outreach Ministry to include new goals that came forward as recommendations from the faith formation task force.

In addition to the ongoing work that has already taken place to connect members to the community and resources needed, a **Ministry Fair** was hosted to allow members to gain a sense for deeper connection to Saint Andrew and **Trunk or Treat** was held October to make outreach to members and the community visible. Special focus is now being placed through this ministry on the connection with our companion congregation, **Zeerust Lutheran Church.** This past year groundwork has been laid to receive 15-17 people from our sister congregation **June 17-June 30, 2020.** 

The focus of their visit is accompaniment, which is a calling to live with and bless others different from the way religion too often has been used to divide people. In the love and forgiveness given in Jesus, we are called into a joy that enriches relationships, deepens life, and is a blessing to all. Pertaining to this visit there are four essential needs:

- Host Homes If you have a spare bed in your home please consider hosting an individual or a couple for one or more blocks of time which will be announced soon.
- **Day Visits**—If you cannot host but would be willing to accompany our siblings in Christ for day excursions or activities, this would help our hosts to balance their commitment.
- **Meals** Invite an individual or several to your home to share a meal and fellowship or take a meal to a home that is hosting guests.
- **Transportation**—Assist host families with transportation as needed.

Ongoing and Existing Opportunities:

- Hospital and Homebound Visitation Area hospitals are contacted during the work week to inquire about member hospitalizations so pastoral care visits can be made to those members. Additionally, regular visits and communion is shared with SALC members that may be unable to leave their homes and attend worship.
- **Sunday Greeters** SALC members volunteer through time and talent to greet members and visitors as they arrive to attend Sunday morning worship services.
- **Care Note Program** There is a materials rack in the Narthex that offers information brochures, as well as reading booklets for all ages to offer comfort and reflection regarding personal situations.
- **Prayer List and Phone Calls** An Outreach Ministry member makes phone calls, sharing with them that they are thought of and that the church is praying for them. Another member makes calls to members who have signed up on their time and talent cards to make food for funerals, Lenten soup desserts and other events as needed.
- Quilt Group On the second Tuesday of each month quilts are made to be shared in the community (the VA and local hospitals, Women's Shelter, Salvation Army, Hospice House, local fire departments).

- **Prayer Shawl Program** Prayer shawls are knitted and crocheted by members for anyone that needs a shawl to provide comfort and prayers.
- **Funeral Guild** When requested by the family, Saint Andrew will prepare and serve a meal following funeral services. There are currently three teams of volunteers who rotate as funerals are scheduled to provide this important time of fellowship.

- Develop casual intergenerational groups
  - New Members, New to Wausau, Widow/Widower/Grief Group

- Milestone Ministries
  - Recognize high school graduates

**Mission:** Develop programs and activities that can be expanded to minister to the needs of the Saint Andrew congregation and to our neighbors beyond the doors of Saint Andrew.

**Goals met by Social Ministry in 2019:** We continued the goal of partnering with other area faith-based non-profit agencies in 2019. We have increased our Wausau Warming Center Saint Andrew volunteer team to staff every Friday night, from November 1 - April 30. We continue to help stock three area school food pantries, making four deliveries a year with funds from the Church Council as well as our ministry. With the congregation supporting our activities, we were able to donate over \$4,400 to our community and church programs. We continue to provide emergency and holiday food baskets to church members, as well as those in need within our community. We were also able to contribute \$1,120 to the ELCA 40 days of Lent to end hunger.

- Supported: Saint Andrew Youth Mission Trip, Tuesday morning quilters, Covenant Community Presbyterian Hearts of Hope, Channel 7 Sharing the Holidays, KATS (Keeping Area Teens Safe), Wausau Warming Center, stocking three area school food Pantries, Faith in Action; help for Elderly drive, Marathon County Hygiene drive, and four community dinners at First Presbyterian Church.
- Fair Trade: This year we expanded beyond just offering coffee, tea and chocolate, by offering more products from the Fair-Trade catalog. We will be helping not only small farmers but small businesses as well. After many years heading our Fair-Trade sales, Ron and Lil Mathsen are taking a well-deserved break. Their great passion and support for the world small farmer spans decades of promoting their cause. Their dedication has been greatly appreciated. We will continue to support Fair Trade with Bob and Terri Wiederhoeft, who will take over with Fair Trade Sales in 2020.

#### Other supported activities

- Super Bowl Snack Sale: Many prepared or purchased snacks to support our annual sale which supports the Saint Andrew food pantry.
- Lenten Soup and Sandwich: Many volunteers, adults and youth alike, help to make our dinners a huge success each year. We are very thankful to the many who supported us by partaking in the meals and purchasing soup, which in turn supports most of our activities throughout the year.
- Tuesday Morning Quilters and Individual Volunteers: Our quilters made 96 quilts and 57 school bags for Lutheran World Relief. Quilts were also made and donated to the Women's Community Inc. and to the Men of Valor for the veterans. Lap activity mats were made and donated to area Alzheimer's patients.
- Congregation: The congregation supported pull-tag boards to help cover the cost of filling 57 school bags and 33 personal care kits for LWR (Lutheran World Relief), Faith in Action Elderly Drive and the Help for the Homeless hygiene drive.
- Community Dinner: Meals were planned, prepared and served by volunteers on four Sundays during 2019. The meals fed an average of 75 people at First Presbyterian Church in downtown Wausau.
- Cradle of Love Baskets: Located at three entry doors to help stock our church emergency food pantry.

- Emergency Food Basket: Available from our church pantry to all who have a need. Call the church office.
- > Holiday Food Baskets: Food baskets are available to all at Easter and Christmas upon request.
- Thanksgiving meal: A traditional Thanksgiving dinner is offered to all, creating an opportunity to both volunteer and to enjoy a meal of fellowship with many church members and neighbors within our community.
- Wausau Warming Center: Continues to offer many opportunities to volunteer as a Saint Andrew Team member or as an individual volunteer. Our team volunteers every Friday night November 1

Last year this report started "2018 was a year of change and transition at Saint Andrew..." I feel the Year 2019 saw that and said: 'Hold my coffee.' Here are some of the changes, challenges, and successes:

- Pastoral staff changes

  - Blossoms and Bows Florist burned down just before Easter. They were our flower provider for many years. The only way to describe what happened next is either a miracle or perfect timing – the Easter flowers were still in route and the owner diverted them to Saint Andrew. The owner maintained the delivery schedule for flowers until May when she was able to hand it off to Floral Magic.
  - Other scheduling and role adjustments First Communion was moved to December, after consulting with the parents. First Faith was moved from Worship to Faith Formation. Children's Choir will be coordinated from Faith Formation also. After reviewing resources and requirements with the new staffing structure and availability, the Sunday 10:45 service was discontinued by council action at the ministry's recommendation.
- Celebrating Success and looking forward to 2020 Saint Andrew's 40<sup>th</sup> Year!
  - Congratulations and thank you to Al Freiberg, who celebrated 25 years with Saint Andrew this year.
  - $\circ$   $\;$  All Saints Day was celebrated with a Dixieland band and the chancel choir brought

down the house.

- Over 1300 people attended Christmas Eve and Christmas services this year. The 4 p.m. children's service featured Silent Night with battery operated candles so even small children could hold them.
- Two 'Equipping the Saints' training sessions were held for ushers, lay readers, and greeters to outline the building security changes and how that affected duties before, during, and after services.
- Worship Ministry worked with Pastor Jenn to plan 2020 Lenten services. Jan Nelson took the lead on theme and structure. Wait and see!
- Finally, none of the challenges could have been met, nor the successes accomplished without many, many hours of work from all the members listed in the opening paragraph. Thank you all.

is a major turning point in the faith journey of many people. There are examples in Scripture about Job (Job 29-30), Elijah (I Kings 19:4-14), Mary Magdalene (Luke 8:1-2) and the women at the tomb (Luke 23:55 – 24:5). Consider the story of the rich young man (Matthew 19:16-26, Mark 10:17-31, Luke 18:18-30). He approached Jesus with a simple question: "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus replied, "Go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven." When the young man heard this, he was very sad and walked away, because he was very rich. Given the choice, he found it difficult to forsake wealth in this world for the promise of God and eternal life.

Sometimes there are barriers or walls that complicate trying something new or stepping out in faith. What walls or barriers have you encountered? Consider the story of Zacchaeus (Luke 19:1-10), who wanted to witness Jesus preaching but was too short to see past the crowd. After Zacchaeus climbed a tree, Jesus called out to him and invited himself to lunch in Zacchaeus' home. We know what Jesus said to Zacchaeus, and he was a different person afterward. He had changed from wanting wealth and success in this world to desiring significance through a life of faith. When have you, or your congregation, chosen success over significance? Perhaps when using numbers or the size of your facilities as a measure. Moving toward significance usually means sacrificing success. In what areas of ministry is your congregation seeking significance today?

Stepping out in faith may be a personal choice for a short time but usually involves accompanying others. As members in the body of Christ, we are not called to meet our own needs alone. The Great Commission (Matthew 28:16-20) calls us to go beyond our barriers and bring the message of Jesus Christ to others. This helps us grow beyond a Christian enclave to become servants of Christ and a serving community. In what ways has your congregation moved from an enclave to a servant community?

Overcoming barriers and walls to make things new involves stepping out in faith. It means shaking loose from lethargy and moving out from sheltered comfort. In the process we break the chains of sin that hold us back and divide us from making us one in Christ. When we share in the distress of God's heart to do the kingdom's work, we are in tune with God's will, choosing significance over success and becoming a servant community. This is when we feel the vitality of our faith and the power of the Holy Spirit. May you experience this newness in Christ in and through your ministry.

- L. Gathering together as God's people in this place, may we always be aware of your presence in our midst.

- L. Knowing that the Word is our light, may we continue to grow in our scriptural and confessional understandings.

- L. Recognizing the importance of Moses, the prophets and disciples, may we work together to accompany and raise up leaders for your church.
- C. Lord, may we have the insight, encouragement and skills to raise up courageous leaders.
- L. Recognizing the many gifts you have entrusted to us, may we use these gifts to do your work in the world today.
- C. Lord, may we use the gifts entrusted to us to do your work.



L. Let us pray. As we strive to be your church of the present and the future, may we nurture a spirit of collaboration and solidarity. May we all be partners in sharing the gospel and believing in Jesus Christ crucified and risen for the life of the world.
